Course Description:

The goal of this course is to assist students in developing their academic spoken English ability. English language learners in higher education require speaking ability and its resources in order to make sense of the complex theoretical framework that surrounds speaking. In addition to providing complementary instructional approaches to support the development of high-quality language performance, this course offers theoretical and functional concentrations of knowledge. In order for students to fully appreciate the practical value of academic spoken English, they need to familiarize themselves with the foundational information on speech production. Students can utilize and use the English language more intelligently when they are aware of the various patterns and characteristics of spoken English. This course starts with theoretical explanations of the peculiarities of the English language and the nature of spoken communication for the same reason. Subsequently, numerous practice exercises are created to support the theoretical content in this course, allowing students to transition from theory to practice and evaluate the caliber of their academic spoken English. These course materials are designed to maximize the reciprocity between spoken English's theoretical and functional components.

Course Learning Outcomes:

The main objectives of this course are as follows:

- 1. To help students identify their flaws in English pronunciation and have an individual plan to rectify them.
- 2. To help students understand the influences on correct English pronunciation.
- 3. To help students adapt their speech organs to get near-perfect native English pronunciation.
- 4. To provide all the necessary knowledge and skills to the students to remember to make a life-long goal to have good English pronunciation.
- 5. To help students eliminate their mother tongue influences in English pronunciation.
- 6. To Assist students to develop fluency and clarity of speech.
- 7. To get student able to use Phonetics to improve their pronunciation.
